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## Appendix 10.1 Baseline Conditions

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### Application Area

- 10.1.1 Early maps, such as Greenwoods map of 1822 show the area mossland from at least the early nineteenth century, with maps Coal mining was taking place in the wider area by the mid nineteenth century. Most of the proposed wind farm is shown as mossland at this time during the early 19<sup>th</sup> century and later.
- 10.1.2 The site contains layers of peat ranging in depth from 0 to 7 m. The peat deposits within the site form part of a much larger area of peat moorland.
- 10.1.3 An extensive area of rig cultivation (RPS ID 3, North Lanarkshire HER number 43471) is located within the site at its eastern end. A series of vertical aerial photographs taken in 1949 show an extensive area of rig cultivation in this location and further to the south. Later aerial photographs show the area covered in plantation woodland and the site visit revealed no surviving remains of the rig.
- 10.1.4 A bing is shown immediately adjacent to the eastern boundary of the site (RPS Site 2). It is likely that former railway tracks, now forestry tracks, within the site are associated with this bing.

### Core Study Area

- 10.1.5 Rig-and-furrow cultivation, located some 250 m west of the site boundary at its nearest point. has been recorded on Polkemmet Moor (RPS ID 7, North Lanarkshire HER number 19085). Vertical aerial photographs taken in 1949 record an extensive area of rig cultivation. The easternmost part has since been destroyed by forestry (NMRS number NS96SW 10).
- 10.1.6 The first edition OS six-inch map of 1864 shows an 'Old Coal Pit' (RPS Site 1) just north of the track leading from Benhar Road past Rimon Cottage. The pit is located on the north side of the track to the east of Rimon Cottage.
- 10.1.7 In addition, rig has also been recorded on Polkemmet Moor located some 150 m south of the boundary of the proposed wind farm (RPS ID 4, North Lanarkshire HER number 19086).
- 10.1.8 An area of rig and furrow cultivation is recorded immediately southeast of the site (RPS ID 84, WoSAS HER numbers 18510 and 18707, NMRS Numbers NS96SW12, NS96SE12). It extends over at least three fields from the South Calder Water in the north to the Edinburgh to Glasgow railway line in the south.
- 10.1.9 Peat cutting has been recorded at Fauldhouse Moss (RPS ID 10, North Lanarkshire HER number 43474), located some 280 m south of the site boundary. The peat cuttings are bounded to the north by the South Calder water and to the south by the Edinburgh to Glasgow rail line.
- 10.1.10 A number of coal mining sites are known around the site.
- 10.1.11 Benhar Colliery (RPS ID 9, North Lanarkshire HER number 14222) is located approximately 270 m west of the site boundary at its nearest point. The colliery is shown on the second edition of the OS six-inch map of 1899 and shows the buildings and spoil tips of Benhar

Colliery Pit No.2 on a siding of the NBR Shotts Branch at NS 8930 6253. Most of this site has been levelled, or opencast, and it is now occupied by an explosives manufacturer. Little now survives above ground.

- 10.1.12 Calderhead Colliery (RPS ID 8, North Lanarkshire HER number 14228) is located on the west side of Benhar Road, approximately 260 m west of the site boundary at its nearest point. The colliery was operated by the Shotts Iron Company. The second edition OS six-inch map of 1899 shows Pit No.3 on a siding of the North British Railway Shotts Branch. By the time of the OS six-inch map of 1921 (resurveyed in 1910) further workings are shown and the mine continued in operation until 1958. All the buildings have now been destroyed, although three large bings remain.
- 10.1.13 Rimmon Colliery (RPS ID 5, North Lanarkshire HER number 14238) is located approximately 170 m south of the site boundary. The 1910 revision of the OS six-inch map of 1923 (revised to 1910) shows Rimmon Colliery Pit No.1. It was located on the site of a coal and ironstone pit shown on the first edition six-inch OS of 1864. A large bing now marks the site of the colliery.
- 10.1.14 Leadloch Colliery (RPS ID 12, North Lanarkshire HER number 43475) is located approximately 370 m south of the site boundary. The colliery first appears on the OS six-inch edition of 1897. At that time sheet xiii NE) shows two 'old shafts'. The coal mine is now disused, and survives as a series of bings.
- 10.1.15 A sub rectangular enclosure recorded from the first edition six-inch OS map of 1864 enclosure is recorded some 420 m east of the site boundary (RPS ID 85 WoSAS HER number 50155, NMRS Number NS96SW42), with a duplicate record located 450 m east of the site boundary (RPS ID 86 WoSAS HER number 18800). The feature seems to represent agricultural activity.
- 10.1.16 There are no SMs within 1.5 km of the site boundary.
- 10.1.17 There are no listed buildings within 1.5 km of the site boundary.

### **Inner Study Area**

- 10.1.18 There are no SMs within 1.5 and 5 km of the site boundary.
- 10.1.19 There are two Category A (RPS ID 171 and 172), seven Category B (RPS ID 173-179) and five Category C (RPS ID 180 - 184) listed buildings within 1.5 and 5 km of the site boundary. Of these listed buildings, RPS ID-174 is located outside the ZTV.
- 10.1.20 Shotts, Calderhead Road, Centrelink 5 (Former Cummins Engine Company Ltd), including Boiler House to NW and Entrance Gates (RPS ID 171, HB Number 50013), listed at category A is located approximately 15.6 km west of the site boundary.
- 10.1.21 The listed building description notes that the building was designed by Ahrends, Burton & Koralek, between 1975 and 1983. The Structural and Building Services Engineers were Ove Arup & Partners and Landesign Group acted as Landscape Architects.
- 10.1.22 The building represents an extensive single storey former diesel engine manufacturing plant, incorporating an earlier 20th century textile mill, all located within a designed landscape which is partly sunken at factory level. The landscape contains various pyramidal shaped hills using excavated material to form a screening and shelter belt at the eastern perimeter,

including along Calderhead Road. The list description states that *“the building is considered to be one of most significant and important examples of large industrial buildings in later 20th century Britain.”*

- 10.1.23 East Main Street, Brucefield Church (Church of Scotland) with Courtyard and Church Halls (including Former Church) (RPS ID 172, HB Number 51254) listed at category A is located approximately 4.9 km north east of the site boundary. The building was designed by Rowand Anderson, Kininmonth and Paul, in 1965-1966 and adjoins a rectangular-plan rubble former Free Church of 1857 with the interior later altered to a gymnasium/hall, a later hall of 1915 and a main hall of 1958. The church is roughly rectangular in plan, in the modernist style.
- 10.1.24 The list description states that *“Brucefield represents the best of post-war church design in Scotland during the 1960s and can be included among a small group of innovative sculptural compositions for the Church of Scotland.”* The listed building is located on the corner of East Main Street and Brucefield Drive, in the centre of Whitburn.
- 10.1.25 'Westcraigs' (RPS ID 173, HB Number 14553) listed at category B is located approximately 4.5 km north of the site boundary. The building dates from the 18<sup>th</sup> century and is of three storeys with a three-bay front, or random rubble with a slated roof. There are cylindrical gate-piers at the west end of the rear yard which has a single storey stables. The building was formerly a coaching inn on the Edinburgh to Glasgow road via Bathgate. The stables now houses a small museum.
- 10.1.26 Fauldhouse, Crofthead Primary School, Sheepphousehill (RPS ID 175, HB Number 18984) listed at category B is located approximately 2.6 km east of the site boundary. The listed building comprises a late 19<sup>th</sup> century school of three-storeys. The listed building is located on the east side of Fauldhouse, at the junction of Eastfield Road and Sheepphouse Hill.
- 10.1.27 Whitburn Parish Kirk (South Church) Manse Road (RPS ID 176, HB Number 42184) listed at category B is located approximately 4.5 km northwest of the site boundary. The listed building is located in the built development of Whitburn.
- 10.1.28 Furnace Bank and Hot Blast Tower, Shotts Ironworks, Burnbrae Road (RPS ID 177, HB Number 43491) listed at category B is located approximately 1.75 km south west of the site boundary. The listed building comprises the surviving remains of an iron-smelting works, founded in 1802 and includes the furnace bank and hot blast tower, the former in sandstone, the latter in brick.
- 10.1.29 Hartwood, Hartwood Hospital (RPS ID 178, HB Number 43858) listed at category B is located approximately 4.5 km south west of the site boundary. The listed building comprises a large Baronial style hospital begun in 1898. The building has a two storey central bay with three storey wings. The building was constructed as the District Asylum for Lanark. Early editions of the OS and modern aerial photography indicate that the hospital was located within its own designed landscape
- 10.1.30 Hartwood, Hartwood Hospital, Nurses' Home (RPS ID 184, HB Number 49672) listed at category C is located approximately 4 km south west of the site boundary and some 450 m southeast of Hartwood Hospital. The building was designed by James Lochhead in 1926 and comprises a large three storey and attic U plan nurses home. The building is associated with the asylum.

- 10.1.31 84 Station Road, St Patrick's Roman Catholic Church and Presbytery (RPS ID 179, HB Number 50146) listed at category B is located approximately 1.6 km south west of the site boundary on the north side of Station Road in Shotts.
- 10.1.32 The listed building was designed by Pugin and Pugin, and built in 1904-5. The listed building comprises a large, eight-bay, basilican-plan Gothic parish church with a canted chancel, lean-to side aisles, and a bow-ended baptistery/ stair tower at the end of the west side aisle. There is a roughly square-plan presbytery attached by a link corridor to the west of the church.
- 10.1.33 Fortissat House (RPS ID 180, HB Number 14192) listed at category C is located approximately 2.5 km west of the site boundary. The listed building is of two storeys, in stones and a slated roof. The building is surrounded by woodland.
- 10.1.34 Blackridge, 60 Main Street, Church of Christ (Former Free Church) (RPS ID 181, HB Number 14552) listed at category C is located approximately 4.75 km north of the site boundary. The listed building dates from 1838 and is in the Gothick style. The building is oblong in plan, of random rubble with a slated roof.
- 10.1.35 Allanton, Old Mill Road, Allanton Mill (RPS ID 182, HB Number 47976) listed at category C is located approximately 3.9 km south west of the site boundary. The mill was a water mill (NMRS number NS85NE 41) and originally dates from the 19<sup>th</sup> century with some parts of the walling possibly being older. The mill was refitted in 1921 with new equipment and the mill building was raised one storey.
- 10.1.36 Stane, 19 Main Street including Boundary Wall (RPS ID 183, HB Number 47986) listed at category C is located approximately 2 km south west of the site boundary. The building dates from 1865, is rectangular in plan and has two storeys with a basement. The building is a former police station with vaulted cells in the basement.
- 10.1.37 There is one GDL within 5 km of the site boundary at its nearest point. This is Allanton, located some 4.9 km southwest of the site boundary of the proposed wind farm. The GDL is located within the ZTV.
- 10.1.38 The inventory description states that:

*"Allanton is situated on the A71 between the villages of Allanton and Bonkle, some 2 miles (3km) north-east of Wishaw and some 5 miles (8km) east of Motherwell. It lies on the rolling hillside along the south bank of the South Calder Water. Above the policies and to the south, the ground rises to the moorland of Black Law 1020' (311m) and King's Law 1000' (305m) in the Lanarkshire Hills. Both the nearby towns of Wishaw and Motherwell have spread almost to the village of Bonkle and to the north the village of Allanton has also expanded. The remaining undeveloped land around the site is in agricultural use but most of the holdings appear to be in poor condition. Former views west along the South Calder Water have now been obscured by buildings. There are good views into the remnants of the site from the improved A71 road, which now divides Allanton almost in half.*

*The house used to lie on the south side of the policies overlooking the lake and the South Calder Water but it has been demolished. The designed landscape was originally encircled by roads. The A71 ran along the western side, before it was realigned through the site, and a minor road runs along the eastern side.*

*Documentary evidence relies on a survey by John Leslie in 1808, descriptions by contemporary commentators, illustrations by W. Turner and others, and the 1st & 2nd edition OS maps of about 1850 and about 1900. These plans indicate that the policies were oval in shape and stretched between the two roads.”*

- 10.1.39 There are no designated assets within the GDL. Early maps indicate that there was a designed view from the house, which was located close to the eastern boundary of the park, looking west across the lake towards Bonkle. The lake, which has been partly backfilled, survived until after 1945, the house did not.

### **Outer Study Area**

- 10.1.40 There are 15 SMs (RPS ID 97- 111), within 5 and 10 km of the site boundary. Of these SMs RPS ID-98, ID-104, ID-105 and ID-111 are located outside the ZTV.
- 10.1.41 There are 11 SMs between 5 and 10 km of the site boundary which also lie within the ZTV. These are discussed below.
- 10.1.42 Bathgate Castle (RPS ID 97, SM number 1904) is located approximately 9.3 km north east of the site boundary.
- 10.1.43 A site visit to the castle during the 1950s revealed “*a grass-covered mound, 2.0m - 3.0m in height, denotes the site of Bathgate Castle. The lay-out of a golf course tends to despoil the outline, but there are two distinct ditches visible, curving round the E perimeter of the mound. The bank formed between them averages 0.6m in height, spread to a width of 8.0m. The inner ditch, which is very shallow, averages 2.0m across. A causeway, 8.0m broad, emerges on the E side. The top of the mound itself is undulating, and no building foundations are to be seen. Part of the bank and ditches on the N side has been cut away by the construction of railway sidings. Although low-lying, much of this ground contains numerous hillocks.*” A further site visit in 1974 revealed a similar disposition. (NMRS number NS96NE 7).
- 10.1.44 Duntilland Hill, cairn (RPS ID 99, SM number 4245), is located approximately 5.3 km north west of the site boundary. The SM comprises the remains of a prehistoric burial cairn, situated above a very steep slope on the top of Duntilland Hill at 285 m OD. The SM is almost circular in plan and measures 13.2 m by 12.5 m. The SM stands approximately 1 m high. It is flat on top with a slight depression in the centre. There are four kerb stones around the sides. The SM is located in a large area of rough grazing.
- 10.1.45 Mid Bracco, deserted farmstead (RPS ID 100, SM number 9661), is located approximately 5.8 km north of the site boundary at its nearest point. The SM comprises a farmstead, a turf-walled building, huts, enclosures and a field system of pre-Improvement date, visible as a series of upstanding banks and other features. The SM is located in rough pasture on the north flank of Black Hill at between 275-230m OD. The farmstead of 'Middle Bracco' is depicted on the Ordnance Survey First Edition map (1859) annotated as ruinous.
- 10.1.46 Mid Bracco, hut circles 350m W of (RPS ID 101, SM number 9664), is located approximately 6.6 km north west of the site boundary. The SM comprises a group of hut circles of uncertain date.
- 10.1.47 Drumfin, deserted settlement 200m W of (RPS ID 102, SM number 9665), is located approximately 7.3 km north west of the site boundary. The SM comprises a farmstead of pre-Improvement date, visible as a series of upstanding banks and other features.



- 10.1.48 The monument is situated in rough pasture at the west end of a terrace on the north side of Drumfin, to the east of Lilly Loch, at between 225-235 m AOD. The monument comprises two buildings set on opposite sides of two conjoined enclosures.
- 10.1.49 Lochend Pit No. 5 and bing, 650m SW of Lochend (RPS ID 103, SM number 9680), is located approximately 8.4 km north of the site boundary.
- 10.1.50 The SM represents the remains of Lochend Colliery Pit No.5 and associated bing of late 19th century date. The schedule description notes that the SM is located in rough pasture. The SM contains the remains of the pit-head buildings and bing. The remains of Lochend Colliery Pit No.5 are remarkable for the survival of a well-preserved bing together with a suite of pit-head buildings. Pit No. 5 was opened in about 1880 by the Brownside Coal Company and in 1948 had an estimated three years of production remaining. It stood on the NBR Longriggend Railway, a branch of the Slamannan Line.
- 10.1.51 Braefoot Farm, cairn 775m SE of (RPS ID 106, SM number 11207), is located approximately 8.2 km north west of the site boundary. The SM comprises a prehistoric cairn constructed of stones and soil, visible as a grass-covered mound. It is located on the crest of a ridge overlooking the Lily Loch at 235 m AOD. The cairn measures 11.2 m in diameter and 1.5 m high from present ground level. This type of cairn is a burial monument of the Bronze Age, around 4000 years old, and may be expected to contain material relating to their mode of construction and use, and to cover an area of prehistoric ground surface.
- 10.1.52 Woodend Farm, farmstead 1400m WSW of (RPS ID 107, SM number 11222), is located approximately 6 km north of the site boundary. The SM represents a farmstead of post-medieval date, located within an area of rough grassland and bracken and comprises the foundations of three buildings and two enclosures. The monument is shown as a ruin on the 1st edition of the OS 6-inch map (Linlithgowshire 1856, sheet viii).
- 10.1.53 Craigmarr, farmstead 720 m WNW of (RPS ID 108, SM number 11223), is located approximately 7.7 km north east of the site boundary. The SM comprises a post medieval farmstead which is visible as an upstanding monument, and contains the foundations of a single building of three compartments with two attached enclosures, situated on a slight elevation. The monument is identified as 'Todholes' and depicted as a ruin on the 1st edition of the OS 6-inch map (Linlithgowshire 1856, sheet viii).
- 10.1.54 Muckraw, building 200m ESE of (RPS ID 109, SM number 11224), is located approximately 9.3 km north west of the site boundary. The SM comprises the upstanding remains of a high status late medieval building.
- 10.1.55 The building measures some 18 m by 7 m transversely and is located in the east corner of a gently sloping field to the east of Muckraw Farm. It is substantial in nature, with large boulders incorporated into the lime-mortared walling, which is over 1 m thick in places. Sections of the walling stand to over 1 m in height. At the east end of the building the remains of a dressed stone window can be seen in the gable end, which has evidently stood much higher in recent times, but has been knocked inwards, filling the central area with rubble. Local tradition holds that this building was a royal hunting lodge. The scale of construction of the building, and its relatively small and simple plan may lend weight to this tradition. The building is identified as a ruin on two early 19th century maps of Linlithgowshire (Forrest, W, 1818 and J. Thomson and Co., 1820). It is also depicted as an unroofed ruin on the 1st edition of the OS 6-inch map (Linlithgowshire 1856-64-5, sheet 4).



- 10.1.56 Woodmuir Farm, coke ovens and reservoir 600m SSE of (RPS ID 110, SM number 11227), is located approximately 5.7 km south east of the site boundary. The monument comprises a bank of coke ovens and associated reservoir and chimney situated alongside a former mineral railway.
- 10.1.57 There are three Category A (RPS ID 185 - 187), and 28 Category B (RPS ID 188 - 215), listed buildings within 5 and 10 km of the site boundary. Of these listed buildings RPS ID-191, ID-194, ID-195, ID-196, ID-197, ID-201, ID-203, ID-204, ID-205 and ID-206 are located outside the ZTV.
- 10.1.58 There are three Category A and 17 Category B listed buildings between 5 and 10km of the proposed wind farm and within the ZTV. These are discussed below.
- 10.1.59 Blackburn House. (RPS ID 185, HB Number 7419), listed at Category A, is located approximately 9.9 km north east of the site boundary, south of the A705 road. The listed building comprises a later 18th century house of two storeys with a basement and attics at the rear. The structure is of coursed rubble with a piended slated roof. There is a projecting central pavilion with a portico. Also listed are two storey offices of random rubble with piended slated roofs which are linked by quadrant walls to the house. The house was perhaps built for George Moncrieff of Blackburn, an agricultural improver.
- 10.1.60 The listed building is located within an equestrian centre, comprising a number of steel portal sheds, itself within pasture fields and it is this that primarily comprises its setting.
- 10.1.61 Gowan Bank Farmhouse, Steading And Cottage (RPS ID 186 HB Number 14557), listed at Category A, is located approximately 8.6 km north west of the site boundary.
- 10.1.62 The listed building is a farmhouse of c.1820 with a large irregular U-plan range added by Sir James Gowans in c.1862.
- 10.1.63 The early range is of two storeys, asymmetrical in plan The door in the centre bay has a motto and entwined 'J'. The 1862 addition is similarly of two storeys. The nearby steading and cottage, to the south of the main house, were constructed by Sir James Gowans in 1842 and 1862. The steading is a simple courtyard type with projections. The cottage is at the south of the east range. The estate is bounded by mannered rubble walls with regularly raised coping.
- 10.1.64 Auchterhead Muir, Covenanters Monument, Darnead-Lin (RPS ID 189 HB Number 671), listed at Category B, is located approximately 5.45 km south of the site boundary.
- 10.1.65 The listed building was constructed in 1836 and comprises a tapered sandstone column, with remnants of paint. The plinth is square in plan, the shaft diminishes with a corbelled cornice as its capital. The inscription reads "*In memory of Cameron, Cargill, Renwick, and their brethren, who worshipped, on this spot, in the time, of the last, persecution. they jeopardised, their lives, unto the death, in the high places of the field.*" A further inscription on the south facing plinth is inscribed: "*Erected, by the proceeds, of, a collection, made at a sermon, preached here, by the, Rev. John Graham, Wishawtown, August 7th 1836.*" Cargill and Renwick were Covenanter martyrs who hid on Auchterhead Muir when on the run following the defeat of the Covenant army lead by James Graham of Claverhouse, Duke of Montrose.
- 10.1.66 Newmains, Church Avenue, Coltness Memorial Church (Church Of Scotland) (RPS ID 190 HB Number 673), listed at Category B, is located approximately 8.3 km south west of the site boundary. Newmains, Manse Road, Newmains Police Station including Boundary Wall and

- Railings (RPS ID 213 HB Number 47982), listed at Category B, is located approximately 7.9 km southwest of the site boundary. Both listed buildings are located within the built development of Newmains.
- 10.1.67 Easter Inch Farmhouse and Steading (RPS ID 192 HB Number 6713), listed at Category B, is located approximately 9.5 km north west of the site boundary.
- 10.1.68 Blackburn Village Bridge, River Almond (RPS ID 193 HB Number 7420), listed at Category B, is located approximately 8.4 km north east of the site boundary at the edge of the built development of Blackburn. The listed bridge is located at the southern end of Blackburn and carries the road from Blackburn to Addiewell over the River Almond.
- 10.1.69 Murdostoun Castle, Lodge (RPS ID 198 HB Number 14190), listed at Category B, is located approximately 6 km south west of the site boundary. The listed building is an early 19th century lodge of one storey with a columned porch and Gothic windows. The listed building forms the lodge to Murdostoun Castle, a building with medieval origins which later became a Georgian country house.
- 10.1.70 Loganlea House (RPS ID 200 HB Number 14209), listed at Category B, is located approximately 7.1 km east of the site boundary. The house is located at the edge of the built development at Loganlea which forms its setting.
- 10.1.71 Old Bedlormio House (RPS ID 202 HB Number 14554), listed at Category B, is located approximately 5.5 km north of the site boundary. The listed building comprises traditional building of the 17th century of two (originally three) storeys. There is a five-bay front and the ends are gabled. The roof is slated. There is a rear wing with a circular stair tower with a conical roof in the re-entrant angle. The end wings are single-storey.
- 10.1.72 Bathgate Academy (RPS ID 187 HB Number 22125), listed at Category A, is located approximately 9.6 km north west of the site boundary. George Street, St David's Church (Church of Scotland) With Bell Tower, Church Halls and Boundary Walls (RPS ID 207 HB Number 22128), listed at Category B, is located approximately 9.4 km north west of the site boundary. Jarvey Street, High Church of Scotland With Graveyard, Boundary Walls, Railings and Gatepiers (RPS ID 208 HB Number 22129), listed at Category B, is located approximately 9.7 km north west of the site boundary. 24-34 (Even Nos) North Bridge Street, The Regal Community Theatre (Former Regal Cinema) (RPS ID 210 HB Number 45918), listed at Category B, is located approximately 9.3 km north west of the site boundary. All of these listed buildings lie within the built development of Bathgate.
- 10.1.73 Cambusnethan, Kirk Road, Former Parish Church including Boundary Wall and Cemetery (Church of Scotland) (RPS ID 209 HB Number 38236), listed at Category B, and Wishaw, 9-35 (Odd Nos) Banchory Road, The Coach House (RPS ID 211 HB Number 47346), listed at Category B, are both located approximately 9.5 km west of the site boundary. Both listed buildings are located within the built development of Wishaw.
- 10.1.74 Bonkle, Murdostoun Road, Murdostoun Bridge (RPS ID 188 HB Number 669), listed at Category B, is located approximately 6.3 km south west of the site boundary. Bonkle, Church Road, Bonkle Parish Church (Church of Scotland) including Church Hall and Gatepiers (RPS ID 212 HB Number 47979), listed at Category B, is located approximately 6.1km southwest of the site boundary. The setting of both listed buildings comprise the built development of Bonkle. Although nominally within the ZTV, both listed buildings are

surrounded by planting and views towards the proposed wind farm would therefore be difficult to obtain.

- 10.1.75 Auchenhard House including Summerhouse and Gatepiers (RPS ID 214 HB Number 49089), listed at Category B, is located approximately 6.7 km east of the site boundary. Auchenhard Farmhouse including Boundary Wall and Gatepiers (RPS ID 215 HB Number 49185), listed at Category B, is located approximately 6.4 km east of the site boundary. Both listed buildings are located on the north side of Breich Water, north of Addiewell.

### **Beyond the Outer Study Area**

- 10.1.76 The Antonine Wall WHS is located approximately 16.5 km north of the site boundary of the proposed wind farm. The closest point where the WHS intersects with the ZTV is some 18.1 km northwest of the site boundary at Grangemouth. This is a small area, nominally covering approximately 700 m of the line of the Antonine Wall. The next closest intersection is over 21 km from the site boundary.
- 10.1.77 There are no GDL within 5 and 10 km of the site boundary. There are no conservation areas or inventoried battlefields within 10 km of the site boundary.
